

Edinburgh & West Lothian Intergenerational Network Meeting Notes

Meeting Held 6th September 2023, 10am-12noon Sight Scotland Veterans, Linburn Centre, West Lothian

Introductions

We introduced ourselves by undertaking a Penny Activity. The penny activity was a demonstration of an intergenerational activity icebreaker. The conversations which came from the activity would help practitioners with their planning of future activities.

Intergenerational Planning Activity

An intergenerational planning tool was then followed to create a fictious project. Those in attendance were divided into groups and met with people whom they did not previously know to plan a project.

During the process the Matt Kaplan levels of intergenerational contact was explained. The levels one to seven demonstrate the various contacts which an intergenerational project could have. Reassurance was given stating that level 1 was not lesser than level 5 or that



the aim was to reach level 7. The important part is to understand that it's not meaning that the higher-level number was better but that our own situations may always remain at a certain lower level due to the circumstance/environment in which we deliver intergenerational projects. The most important part is the quality of intergenerational relationships which take place at each level. Though we can move through the levels too.

GWT's 9th AGM will be held in Brunswick House, Wilson Street, Glasgow on Monday 13/11/23 from 4pm – 5pm. Each Network area has two votes, and we are looking for two people from the Edinburgh & West Lothian Network to vote on behalf of members.

If people are unable to attend on the day they can still vote online. We will be having a couple of changes to our constitution. Please let Louisa know if you would be interested in becoming a voting member. Before the AGM some paperwork will be forwarded to voting members to read over.

At the meeting - Louisa shared about her role within GWT as part of the National Lottery Community Fund Creating Intergenerational Communities Programme Pilot and how she was engaging with communities across Scotland to trial out a new intergenerational Guidance Tool to support practitioners when delivering an intergenerational project. Louisa explained that Sight Scotland Veterans was one of the organisations who would be involved with the Pilot.

Mary shared that she was new to post and found the intergenerational connections an exciting prospect. Mary shared about the links with Firhill High School and how the young people had visited the centre with the veterans going to visit the school soon to enable a two-way interaction. She said the veterans had got a lot from the young people visiting and the some of the young people asked when they could return as they left the building.

Conversations flowed between everyone, and a number of topics were discussed.

Alison shared about her research mentoring work and the challenges she faced with older volunteers and the young people. Discussions and advice was given from everyone, sharing their experience. After the discussions Alison was keen to step up a steering group to support the intergenerational project.



We shared about some obstacles in setting up a digital intergenerational project for basic skills and confidence building. Examining whether there was demand or a need for such a project remembering to consult with potential participants on what they would like to do rather than assume that it would be a good thing for them. Regarding digital courses we discussed the home opportunities for people to practice on their own equipment and whether it was practical for them to fully engage.

Gemma shared that Vintage Vibes had begun a relationship with Corstorphine Primary and was in the middle of a staged process of the children getting to know what it would be like to be around older people and discussing stereotypes.

Hetty Malcom-Smith, from SOPA, could not attend the Network meeting but wanted to share: -



The Scottish Older People's Assembly (SOPA) successfully submitted a bid to the Tudor Trust in 2021 to develop Age-friendly Communities across Scotland and work started in earnest in early 2022. SOPA is leading on this work to stimulate local and national action to achieve better outcomes for people in and approaching later life, using the World Health Organisation (WHO) Age-friendly Communities Framework.



What is an Age-friendly Community?

An Age-friendly Community is somewhere where local people come together to make life better for the people who live there, particularly as they age. These places make it possible for people to continue to stay living in their homes, participate in the activities that they value, and contribute to their communities, for as long as possible. Being Age-friendly means designing services and facilities with older people, not for them.

South Lanarkshire Council became the first council in Scotland in June 2023 to be classed as an Age Friendly Community.

Networking and training have been taking place across Scotland, England, Wales, and Northern Ireland, engaging with diverse communities who are planning intergenerational connections, whilst following the Creating Intergenerational Communities Programme Pilot.

Intergenerational practitioners participating with the Pilot will receive support to deliver projects whilst following a Guidance Tool which includes testing of intergenerational Quality Indicators and reflecting upon their practice. New tools for measuring impact of intergenerational work

The World Health Organisation has published two relevant evidence and gap maps on reducing social isolation and loneliness, which would prove useful to intergenerational practitioners seeking evidence to boost funding bids.

Growing Together Naturally case study

Childminders & Grandfriends Forest School, Torbay

This intergenerational project was funded by Connecting Actively to Nature and Orchard Forest School. Particularly during the last couple of years, with the pandemic, we learnt very quickly that our over 50's group had been expressing how much that they were missing the physical contact with their younger family members due to the lack of contact and ability to travel up and down the country to visit, so we decided to pilot an intergenerational approach in an outdoor space.
