Intergenerational Planning and Matt Kaplan Levels of contact

We discussed planning an intergenerational (IG) project and looked at the planning resource that GWT offered. We looked at Matt Kaplans levels of contact. People took the resources with them and may utilise them when thinking of their own project plans.

We touched on evaluation and **Bella** agreed to send some ideas on how to evaluate.

Local Updates

To begin with **Vicki** informed Bella that Uist consisted of a many areas and islands and as such to contact all and personalise this is a good way to reach out to communities. The areas are:

- Eriskay
- South Uist
- Benebecula
- North Uist
- Berneray

As such in future **Vicki and Bella** will look at the email list for the Western Isles and have it updated together and separte Uist from Leiws and Harris when sending out correspondence. The dicsusison went into the history of the island areas and we spoke about going to where people are and how engagement and demographics are something that is a little more complicated in Island life.

Sheena spoke about the locality plan for North Uist and how it is a live plan which UCVO is working with local council and others to engage with the communty. The group in general had discussions around planning and things that they though may bring generations together in Uist. Thought of contacing the school to make soup or something with others maybe look at the church and ideas of what they could do? Look at small projects maybe once a month.

Marion Anne told us about intergenerational connections with Lochner school involved with Caraideanuibhist inviting people mid 40s to 90 year old taking part in a games afternoon and this has been something regular that has been successful.

Deborah explained that she has been involved in celeidh concerts but has had challenges getting hold of any young people and is hoping to get more young people involved to join. She has been involved in a celeidh planning meeting and the sessions are hosted in the church hall 2-4 pm once a month with transport provided for the young people. Deborah has received extra funding to hold celeidhs all over Uist. She will be contacting Berneray. She commented that finding most people from nearby was her task and decisions to be made on local musicians and food. She felt that Berneray was a good place to start looking at a Saturday afternoon and agreed on transport. She also has printed out songs with words in gaelic.

Laura is working in a secondary school as a Welbeing Practioner and IG is something that she is intersted in. She may think of an IG idea. We spoke about isolation and loneliness and retired older people (retirement in general) with little to do. **Vicki** spoke about Bayhead where she used to live its more like a village and that everyone talked to each other. Getting to know your neighbours is something that is imporant in rural life.

Since one of the earlier network session in 2022 **Joan** from **Sgoil an lochdair** got in touch with **Marion Ann Caraideanuibhist** and there was an event at the beginning fo the year in schools in North Uist with students participating in music. Joan got in touch after this and they had some coffee mornings. They have managed to connect regularly.

Deborah has spoken with the librarian at Liniclate Community School and they are training children to be readers. A couple of volunteers come from the school to support people. **Vicki** offered to help **Deborah** with any organising for future work and they can contact **Bella** for resources.

Everyone at the meeting is keen to look at intergenerational work on the island and explore opportunities. It was agreed that Generations Working Together will provide a learning workshop in 2024. Dates and times to be confirmed. UCVO has offered use of the Board room. Planning this with Vicki and anyone else who is interested.

We are changing the format of our usual annual conference and will not be hosting an International Conference in 2024. 7. Creating Intergenerational Communities Programme

Excitement abounds as Scotland (GWT) engages communities to formally sign a Partnership Understanding to be part of the Creating Intergenerational Communities Programme Pilot.

Networking and training have been taking place across Scotland, England, Wales, and Northern Ireland, engaging with diverse communities who are planning intergenerational connections, whilst following the Creating Intergenerational Communities Programme Pilot.

Intergenerational practitioners participating with the Pilot will receive support to deliver projects whilst following a Guidance Tool which includes testing of intergenerational Quality Indicators and reflecting upon their practice. The Scottish Older People's Assembly (SOPA) successfully submitted a bid to the Tudor Trust in 2021 to develop Age-friendly Communities across Scotland and work started in earnest in early 2022. SOPA is leading on this work to stimulate local and national action to achieve better outcomes for people in and approaching later life, using the World Health Organisation (WHO) Age-friendly Communities Framework. New tools for measuring impact of intergenerational work

The World Health Organisation has published two relevant evidence and gap maps on reducing social isolation and loneliness, which would prove useful to intergenerational practitioners seeking evidence to boost funding bids.

Growing Together Naturally case study

Childminders & Grand friends Forest School, Torbay

This intergenerational project was funded by Connecting Actively to Nature and Orchard Forest School. Particularly during the last couple of years, with the pandemic, we learnt very quickly that our over 50's group had been expressing how much that they were missing the physical contact with their younger family members due to the lack of contact and ability to travel up and down the country to visit, so we decided to pilot an intergenerational approach in an outdoor space.
