Intergenerational Planning and Matt Kaplan Levels of contact

We discussed planning an intergenerational (IG) project and looked at the planning resource that GWT offered. We looked at Matt Kaplans levels of contact and discussed this a little bit agreeing that we are not always going to reach level 7 but the important part is to understand that its not meaning it is better because it's a higher number but more that its different levels and sometimes we must accept that our own situations will sit at level 3 or 4 and in the beginnings at 1 or 2. We can move throught the levels too.

Local Updates

Vincent let everyone know about the project that has been running for over 10 years now building skiffs (boats) with young and odler people connecting to take part. The project is starting a new one in Dalmellington with Doune Academy and he will keep us up to date with how things progress. Feedback from the older people in these projects is that it was and has been a great feeling working with younger people.

The group then spoke about care homes in Ayrshire and that there was a project where the young people used to go to the care homes to visit after the school day. One of the group used to take part in a care home when she went to meet her mum after work and would read to older people while she was waiting.

Kay spoke about **Age Well** and how they had changed the name from Age Concern. They have worked with the community pre covid and post covid and have managed to link people and bring the community together. A gardeing group formed out of covid with some social gardening and they grow food with people from a different age. People mentioned Mens Sheds in Largs and Vincent is looking into Mens Sheds to set one up in Troon and would like a contact with Largs. Group members will offer a contact for him.

Community Larder – is supplied by Community Roots and is worked on that people pay a small amount. The HUB shares the produce with local stores and there is always a wall of free food. Various initiatives have come out of this such as fuel poverty, food poverty, food waste. They work naturally in an intergenerational way with different age groups and a good example is a local swing park where all gens take part and its very interactive.

Kay explained that attending the meeting was something that would help her to establish more of the core of an idea that she is hoping to develop. Kay asked Bella to put her in touch with examples. (**Kay to contact Bella to discuss further**).

Vincent offered some ideas to get help through Community Payback Team and suggested if anyone needed some work done this was a good route.

Barbara started asking older people what they would like with the vast majority asking to get out and about find out more about local area and look for somewhere to come together.

Bella agreed to send info from Soil Assiociation to Fi. Fi to conatct Bella for anything.

Lorraine mentioned the Joint Action Group looking at bringing together IG work and a mapping exercise to see what is happening in area. **Sandra McMath** is working with **Helen Watson** (Public Health) looking at a literature review of IG practice. They are aware of projects and are looking at getting others off the ground. She offered examples as follows:

- Time Team Action Group.
- Craigie Allotments.
- Allotments in Troon.
- South Ayrshire Community Partnership.
- Thriving Communities.

The GWT Intergenerational Ayrshire Roadshow encompassing Ayrshire wide will take place in April 2024 (26th is the provisional date). The fine details are being worked out and we will share asap.

7. Creating Intergenerational Communities Programme

Excitement abounds as Scotland (GWT) engages communities to formally sign a Partnership Understanding to be part of the Creating Intergenerational Communities Programme Pilot.

Networking and training have been taking place across Scotland, England, Wales, and Northern Ireland, engaging with diverse communities who are planning intergenerational connections, whilst following the Creating Intergenerational Communities Programme Pilot.

Intergenerational practitioners participating with the Pilot will receive support to deliver projects whilst following a Guidance Tool which includes testing of intergenerational Quality Indicators and reflecting upon their practice. Growing Together Naturally case study

Childminders & Grand friends Forest School, Torbay

This intergenerational project was funded by Connecting Actively to Nature and Orchard Forest School. Particularly during the last couple of years, with the pandemic, we learnt very quickly that our over 50's group had been expressing how much that they were missing the physical contact with their younger family members due to the lack of contact and ability to travel up and down the country to visit, so we decided to pilot an intergenerational approach in an outdoor space.
