Intergenerational Planning and Matt Kaplan Levels of contact

We had some introductions and then discussed planning an intergenerational (IG) project and looked at the planning resource that GWT offered. We looked at Matt Kaplans levels of contact and talked about planning and using the resource to assist with planning and thinking about IG projects. Also spoke about he importance of IG training and standards of IG work.

We touched on <u>Age Friendly Communities</u> and Scottish Older Peoples Assembly are leading on <u>Age Friendly Communities in Scotland</u> and are working to get local councils to sign up to this. An Age-friendly Community is somewhere where local people come together to make life better for the people who live there, particularly as they age.

These places make it possible for people to continue to stay living in their homes, participate in the activities that they value, and contribute to their communities, for as long as possible. Being Age-friendly means designing services and facilities with older people, not for them.

Local Updates

John mentioned LDVG and the work that they have been involved in with technology and IT and older volunteers along with senior pupils from a local high school. The classes have now stopped but the 5th year IT group are hosting their first meeting this week on Mondays for ½ hour volunteering a drop in session open to the public for phone / ipads. John told us about an exercise class that happens in LDVG with an older and youngfer person delivering the classes together, a sports group with two generations.

Denis mentioned Chatterbox Project which was born out of COVID and a quartely newsletter. He also mentioned that now there are 49 older people who are digitally confident. People spoke about COVID and how in the beginning most older people did not want to go online and it was mostly connection through phone calls. But now everything is online. This can be difficult as it is not easy to read facial expression.

We spoke about social HUBS and learning and how its all about speaking with each other for example 'Routes to Work' for young people who are hard to reach it's a good thing that they end up chatting to older people, in the beginning they were worried but they soon end up friends. There is the assumption that young people have grandparents and older people have grandchildren but this is not always the case.

Denis spoke about the forum, and how it's a forum for people to talk and be heard and share there is not so much opportuity for intergenerational. **Bella** would lke the opportunity to speak with the forum through an article and offer free membership to anyone intersted. GWT is FREE to join for anyone living in Scotland.

Bella mentioned community safety and the Community Knowledge Fund and the conversation moved to talking about safety in the street, IG relationships and meeting with older people. You can read further down and see a link to the film in National Updates.

Allys offered info on <u>Trees for Cities</u> Project. People can contact Allys for further info. Let Bella know and she will send to them.

We also held a discussion about it being good for young people to be outdoors. Group spoke about Sporting Memories and what a good resource this can be and a way of bringing ages together around sport.

Amanda spoke about Clydesdale Community Initiative and gardening, she is keen to get people onsite. She also menbtioned CCI Clydesdale Community Initative https://langlochfarm.org/ (Langloch Farm) and Carluke Development Trust. Bella agreed to visit and the next meeting in 2024 will take place in Carluke.

Jackie and Diamonds in the Community offered a quick overview of some of the activities that they are involved in. It is a football charity in Airdrie wit a babybank – childrens clothes, toys, nappies. There are other groups that take place such as walk and talk, they have teenage volunteers, memories football group with primnary school, art group on Friday morninigs, Chit Chat Café. They use Airdrie Workmans Club. **Bella** agred to meet with Jackie and a group and look at a talk on ageism and sterotypes and IG work in general.

Next meetings will be Carluke in 2024 with dates to be confirmed. Look out for thematic network dates and online surgeries. See below in National Updates.

The Community Knowledge Fund allowed Generations Working Together the time to explore community safety and looking at intergenerational solutions to bring generations together in our communities and test if doing so would alleviate perceived fear of crime. 7. Creating Intergenerational Communities Programme

Excitement abounds as Scotland (GWT) engages communities to formally sign a Partnership Understanding to be part of the Creating Intergenerational Communities Programme Pilot.

Networking and training have been taking place across Scotland, England, Wales, and Northern Ireland, engaging with diverse communities who are planning intergenerational connections, whilst following the Creating Intergenerational Communities Programme Pilot.

Intergenerational practitioners participating with the Pilot will receive support to deliver projects whilst following a Guidance Tool which includes testing of intergenerational Quality Indicators and reflecting upon their practice. 8. Age Friendly Communities

The Scottish Older People's Assembly (SOPA) successfully submitted a bid to the Tudor Trust in 2021 to develop Age-friendly Communities across Scotland and work started in earnest in early 2022. SOPA is leading on this work to stimulate local and national action to achieve better outcomes for people in and approaching later life, using the World Health Organisation (WHO) Age-friendly Communities Framework. New tools for measuring impact of intergenerational work

The World Health Organisation has published two relevant evidence and gap maps on reducing social isolation and loneliness, which would prove useful to intergenerational practitioners seeking evidence to boost funding bids.

Growing Together Naturally case study

Childminders & Grand friends Forest School, Torbay

This intergenerational project was funded by Connecting Actively to Nature and Orchard Forest School. Particularly during the last couple of years, with the pandemic, we learnt very quickly that our over 50's group had been expressing how much that they were missing the physical contact with their younger family members due to the lack of contact and ability to travel up and down the country to visit, so we decided to pilot an intergenerational approach in an outdoor space.
